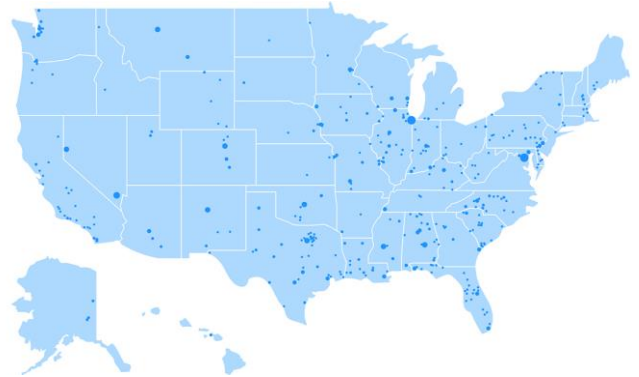


Program Mission

The **Federal Bureau of Prisons (FBOP), Chaplaincy Services Branch** launched the Community Reentry Network (CRN), a website of resources for returning citizens and those who want to help the citizens reintegrate with society. The CRN allows returning citizens to search a database of thousands of organizations.

Key Features & Benefits

- **Education** – On reentry programs for citizens
- **Program Search and Map** – Functionality for citizens to search for resources near them
- **Organization Information** – Faith-based organizations can list services that they provide
- **Organization Sign Up** – Organizations can volunteer to be a resource in the CRN



Upcoming Opportunities

The Federal Bureau of Prisons works with a consulting agency that has **proven success on programs to drive awareness to citizens about the opportunities to support adults in custody** – including various marketing efforts that drove awareness for opportunities at the FBOP by generating more than **40M ad views and 6.5M views** across all content for several FBOP programs, exceeding industry benchmarks by 15 points. The Federal Bureau of Prisons plans to continue to grow awareness to the public of the CRN platform about the evidence-based programming thereby increasing public safety.
